MEMBERSHIP



FROM HARRISBURG

Take Interstate 83 South to Rt. 581 West then Rt. 15 South about 5 miles. From Rt. 15 South immediately after passing the Turnpike (US 76) entrance, exit onto the Cumberland Parkway/Winding Hill Road. Turn left at the first light, and then left at the next light. After crossing the bridge, turn right at the light onto Mt. Allen Drive. Messiah Village is a quarter-mile on the right.

A "WALK ON THE WILD SIDE" AT LAKE LOUISE, ALBERTA, CANADA

The presenter's favorite vacation activities are hiking and sightseeing in the Lake Louise area of the Canadian Rockies. During the summer of 2010, Steve and his wife, Janeann, made a trip to Lake Louise accompanied by church friends, Dick and Louise Henry. The Henrys are avid and accomplished sportsmen and photographers. This presentation chronicles two hikes at Lake Louise and a canoe excursion on Moraine Lake with photographs. The pictures show the area's spectacular alpine scenery, the lush vegetation and abundant wildlife, the glacial features, the history, and unique natural phenomenon. A FLYER'S STORY

Steve Runkle's favorite Uncle, Bill Riddleberger, had a remarkable military career both before and during World War II. Before the war, Uncle Bill enlisted as an U. S. Army Air Corps mechanic maintaining pre-war aircraft. When the war started, the requirement for a pilot to be a college graduate was dropped, and Bill was accepted in the Army Air Corp's pilot training

program. He made it through the rigorous training and became a B-24 co-pilot. On D-day, he arrived in England to join the 8th Air Force in their bombing missions over Europe. After 19 successful missions, Bill was shot down over the Rhine valley. Badly burned, he was treated in a German hospital and sent to a POW camp on the Baltic Sea. After liberation, he returned home to Lewistown, Pa. to start a new life. Then in 1992, Bill traveled to Europe and met the Germans who shot him down. This is Bill's story. (Note: An audio recording of World War II era music is played as an introduction to this presentation.)

"OVER THERE" AND BACK HOME: AMERICA IN WORLD WAR I

One hundred years ago, the New World came to the rescue of the Old, as a million American troops mobilized to join the Allied cause in World War I. This two-part program will highlight the wartime experience of Americans, on both the Western Front and the home front. The American Expeditionary Forces included National Guardsmen from Harrisburg and Carlisle, feted and cheered by their communities as they shipped out to help "make the world safe for democracy." They and their fellow "doughboys" did not see major action until the summer of 1918, but they played a decisive role in the final push to defeat German aggression. Meanwhile, patriotic civilians back home bought liberty bonds, planted victory gardens, and railed against "the Hun" who brought echoes of war into their quiet and orderly lives.

PETER COOPER: AN UNSUNG AMERICAN HERO

This course is about Peter Cooper and his contribution to life in America. He is best known for being the inventor of the first American steam locomotive. He became one of America's most wealthy and successful businessmen because of his business skills. Peter Cooper was also a social reformer. He advocated for free public school education and started a college.

FIRST LADIES: 19TH CENTURY, PART 2

As we look at the fourth session on First Ladies, we will be looking at the role of Louisa Adams, Sarah Polk, Abigail Fillmore and Caroline Harrison. Louisa Adams, born in England, was acknowledged as an advisor for her husband, while Sarah Polk was constantly helping her husband with his speeches and became one of the most popular First ladies. Abigail Fillmore, the First Lady to hold a job (teacher) after she was married, helped to shape the book collection for the White House, as well as introduced regular use of music for entertainment (piano, harp and guitar). Caroline Harrison, with a deep love of the history of the White House, helped form the National Association of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and helped to raise funds for Johns Hopkins medical school, only if they would admit women (the late 1880s).

CHRISTIAN THEOLOGIES OF 18TH CENTURY AMERICA

Similar to American Christianity today, the Christian denominations of 18th century America were diverse. Of special interest will be the teachings of Johann Arndt, a founder of Lutheran Pietism, one of whose followers was Andreas Hagenbuch of Berks County, PA.

Several hundred miles towards the center of the country the city of Abuja, the country's planned capital city, continues to emerge from the savannah. Although no longer the national capital, Lagos has become one of the world's mega cities with substantial unplanned as well as planned growth. Additionally, Nollywood has become a major film center.

FLAMES BEYOND GETTYSBURG: THE CONFEDERATE EXPEDITION TO THE SUSQUEHANNA RIVER

In late June 1863, two powerful columns of Confederate troops approached the Susquehanna River in south-central Pennsylvania. One marched northeasterly from Franklin County through Carlisle toward Harrisburg and the other headed eastward through Gettysburg and York towards Wrightsville/ Columbia. This PowerPoint presentation by veteran author Scott L. Mingus Sr. will cover the latter command, that of Maj. General Jubal A. Early, as it conquered Gettysburg after a series of skirmishes on June 26 and then two days later occupied York, the largest Northern town to fall to the Confederates during the entire war. General Early ransomed York for money and supplies and surrounded the town with artillery and troops. Hastily organized state militia defended the river crossing at Wrightsville and then burned the world's longest covered bridge to prevent Rebel passage into Lancaster County, from which Jubal Early had hoped to threaten Harrisburg.

HANS HERR HOUSE AND THE CONESTOGA HISTORICAL SOCIETY – TOUR

We will visit the Hans Herr House (1719) located on the oldest homestead in Lancaster County. This will include a guided tour of the house and grounds. In addition, there will be a guided tour of the Lancaster Longhouse, a full scale replica of a Susquehannock Longhouse that harkens back to a time before European contact. This is truly a unique exhibit that will aid in understanding the Native Americans who lived in this area.

The Conestoga Area Historical Society Museum showcases much of the history of the area. The museum, located in an 1860's tobacco barn, houses

a variety of Native American artifacts and other early 1700's information and exhibits. Other exhibits showcase the 18th and early 19th century history of Lancaster County. The grounds include a restored 1733 log house, a blacksmith shop, restored stone house, squirrel tale bake oven, craftsmen shops, and restored local tannery, a Switzer bank barn and a meeting hall.

The day of touring will acquaint you with the early history of a part of Lancaster.

Glorious Times... tells the fascinating story of an American clan of Scots-Irish origin that settled in and near the South Mountain "Cradle of Conservation" close to nature, with the Yellow Breeches Creek flowing past its backyard, woods just beyond fields and meadows, and the mountain within walking distance. Since the early 1700s, this remarkable family called and still calls "Craighead Station" Pennsylvania its "home," even though many of its members settled elsewhere in the country. But they always return. In Tom Benjey's engaging telling of the Craighead story through the centuries and generations, he focuses attention on the generation of Craigheads we know best: that of the twins Frank Jr., John, and their sister Jean Craighead George; but he doesn't neglect the earlier generations of Craighead naturalists either.
