

TOGETHER, THEY MADE THE MODERN AMERICAN FIRST LADYSHIP: ELEANOR ROOSEVELT TO LAURA BUSH

This series will include apolitical presentations as researched by the instructor, on the lives and contributions made by the twelve women considered by historians as the modern day First Ladies.

Following an introduction, the sessions will cover Eleanor Roosevelt; Elizabeth Truman and Mamie Eisenhower; Jacqueline Kennedy and Lady Bird Johnson; Thelma Nixon, Elizabeth Ford, and Rosalynn Carter; Nancy Reagan and Barbara Bush; and Hillary Rodham Clinton and Laura Bush.

LH09 "OVER THERE" AND BACK HOME: AMERICA AND WORLD WAR I

One hundred years ago, the New World came to the rescue of the Old, as nearly five million American troops mobilized to join the Allied cause in World War I. This two-part program will highlight the wartime experience of Americans, on both the Western Front and the home front. The American Expeditionary Forces included Pennsylvania National Guardsmen, feted and cheered by their communities as they shipped out to help "make the world safe for democracy." They and their fellow doughboys did not see major action until the summer of 1918, but they played a decisive role in the final push to defeat German aggression. Meanwhile, patriotic civilians back home bought liberty bonds, planted victory gardens, and railed against "the Hun" who rained destruction on a seemingly innocent world.

THE GIRLS OF ATOMIC CITY – THE UNTOLD STORY OF THE WOMEN WHO HELPED TO WIN WORLD WAR II

This is the story of young women who traveled to Oakridge, TN during WWII to live and work in a secret city. They left home to fight the war in their own way. Unknowingly, they worked tirelessly to help enrich the uranium needed for the world's first atomic bomb. Without them, the Manhattan project would not have achieved its objectives.

LH11 WHO ARE THESE PEOPLE AND WHAT IN THE WORLD DID THEY DO?

When we were students in school our history classes primarily centered around world events and dates on which, or during which, they occurred. This program will include events and dates but will focus primarily on the people who were the main driving forces behind the events. Who were they? What motivated them? What do we know about their personalities? How were they influenced by their environment, etc.?

Using a panel of historical figures pictured on postage stamps, session one will involve identifying and briefly discussing the historical figures portrayed on the stamps. In preparation for session two, class participants will be asked to research one of the historical figures of greatest interest to them and then present a few interesting facts about their selected person.

LH12 FIRST LADIES, 19TH CENTURY, PART 2 Instructor: Ms. Mary Furlong

As we look at the fourth session on First Ladies, we will be looking at the role of Jane Pierce, Sarah Polk, Abigail Fillmore and Caroline Harrison. Jane Pierce, with the loss of a son, became involved with the founders of the Spiritualism craze that swept the country in the 1850's, while Sarah Polk was constantly helping her husband with his speeches and become one of the most popular First ladies. Abigail Fillmore, the First Lady to hold a job (teacher) after she was married, helped to shape the book collection for the White House, as well as introducing regular use of music for entertainment (piano, harp and guitar). Caroline Harrison, with a deep love of the history of the White House, helped form the National Association of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and helped to raise funds for Johns Hopkins medical school, only if they would admit women (the late 1880s).

LH13 JOY TO THE WORLD! THE STORIES BEHIND OUR FAVORITE CHRISTMAS CAROLS

Among other fascinating facts, you'll learn who King Wenceslas really was... how a partridge got into a pear tree... why a Pennsylvania pastor immortalized the visit of the three kings to the baby Jesus... and how a snowy, starry night in an Austrian village inspired a beloved song of Christmas joy and peace.

LH14 A FLYER'S STORY

Steve Runkle's favorite Uncle, Bill Riddleberger, had a remarkable military career both before and during World War II. Before the war, Uncle Bill enlisted as an U. S. Army Air Corps mechanic maintaining pre-war aircraft. When the war started, the requirement for a pilot to be a college graduate was dropped, and Bill was accepted in the Army Air Corp's pilot training program. He made it through the rigorous training and became a B-24 co-pilot. On D-day, he arrived in England to join the 8th Air Force in their bombing missions over Europe. After 19 successful missions, Bill was shot down over the Rhine valley. Badly burned, he was treated in a German hospital and sent to a POW camp on the Baltic Sea. After liberation, he returned home to Lewistown, Pa. to start a new life. Then in 1992, Bill traveled to Europe and met the Germans who shot him down. This is Bill's story. (Note: An audio recording of World War II era music is played as an introduction to this presentation.)

HANS HERR HOUSE AND THE CONESTOGA HISTORICAL SOCIETY - TOUR

Hans Herr House and Conestoga Historical Society, Willow Street, PA *See cost and transportation details below Enrollment Limit: 26

The Hans Herr House (1719) is located on the oldest homestead in Lancaster County. This visit will include a guided tour of the house and grounds. In addition, there will be a guided tour of the Lancaster Longhouse, a full scale replica of a Susquehannock Longhouse that harkens back to a time before European contact. This is truly a unique exhibit that will aid in understanding the Native Americans who lived in this area.

The Conestoga Area Historical Society Museum showcases much of the history of the area. The museum, located in an 1860's tobacco barn, houses a variety of Native American artifacts and other early 1700's information and exhibits. Other exhibits showcase the 18th and early 19th century history of Lancaster County. The grounds include a restored 1733 log house, a blacksmith shop, restored stone house, squirrel tale bake oven, craftsmen shops, and restored local tannery, a Switzer bank barn and a meeting hall.

This day of touring will acquaint you with the early history of an important part of Lancaster!

This unique opportunity will feature a special tour of Brubaker Farms located near Mount Joy in Lancaster County. Brubaker Farms is owned by Luke and Barbara Brubaker, in partnership with their two sons. Luke's father purchased the farm in 1929 and started the operation with 8 cows. Luke purchased the farm from his father in the 70's, at which time the operation consisted of 18 cows. In early 1990's Luke's sons, Mike and Tony, graduated from college and chose to return to the farm to help run the 200head operation. At that time a family partnership was formed and expansion ensued. Presently the farm has about 950 milk cows, 800 young stock and also raises 250,000 broiler chickens annually on 1000+ acres of cropland. These expansions to the operation allow it to provide the necessary income to sustain the 3 farm families that now rely on it for their economic wellbeing. In addition to family labor, 14 employees and their families are also supported by the farm.

The Brubaker family has taken many voluntary, as well as numerous required, steps to ensure the farm is environmentally compliant and economically sustainable. All tracts have approved soil conservation plans to ensure the soil resources are protected. The farm's animal numbers exceed thresholds for mandatory nutrient management plans, requiring them to implement a Pennsylvania's Act 38 nutrients management plan as well as carry a Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO) permit. Additional permits, issued by PA DEP, are held for manure storages. An odor management plan, regulating odors emerging from the production facilities, is also in place. In addition to the required aforementioned plans, the Brubaker family has voluntarily constructed a manure digester to convert cow manure into energy. The energy produced by the digester provides fulltime power for 150-200 homes.
