MEMBERSHIP

UNDERGROUND RAILROAD ORIGINS IN LANCASTER COUNTY AND SOUTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA

This two-part course explores the national legacy of the Underground Railroad, regarded as our nation's first racially-integrated & religiously-inspired civil rights movement born in the wake of the America Revolution. Lancaster and York Counties provided a backdrop for some of the earliest anti-slavery episodes in America which formed the origins of the movement that became known as the Underground Railroad by the late 1830s.

A classroom presentation is followed a week later by a half-day tour. The tour begins in Wrightsville, York County and ends in the historic City of Lancaster. Six properties are recognized by the National Park Service as authentic Underground Railroad sites. Up to five stops may be made, depending on guest preferences, weather, time availability, etc.

Participants will enjoy a boxed lunch at Trinity Lutheran Church.


