

The registration fees for Fall 2021 have been increased to reflect the adjusted cost of living and the growing administrative costs as programming has expanded and developed. We remain committed to stewarding resources wisely and balancing program sustainability with accessibility for participants.

Some courses have additional fees - for admission, transportation, supplies, etc. - to be paid in addition to the registration fees. Fees for some excursions were increased due to safety restrictions resulting in reduced enrollment limits. Also, this year's transportation fees were revised by Landis Homes.

Please note that the course fees are per person, NOT per household. Members of the same household will need to register separately and pay separately. Please send a check for each person separately.

As a member of Pathways Institute, you will receive a 10% discount at the Landis Homes dining venues on course days. Your membership card must be shown to receive the discount. Access to dining facilities will

be dependent on safety guidelines at the time of each course. Membership cards are available at the Pathways Institute office upon request.

Refunds

Refunds for All Membership Options

If a refund is requested before the start of the term, the membership fee will be refunded minus a \$10 administrative fee.

Partial refunds for membership options are not available.

Refunds for Pay-Per-Course Option

If a course is cancelled by Pathways Institute, a refund will be given at \$20 per each course.

If a person drops a course at least fourteen days prior to the course start date, a refund of \$20 will be given. If a course is dropped fewer than 14 days before the course start date, no refund will be given.

In the summer and autumn of 1944, an array of German secret weapons began appearing on the battlefields of Europe. The Allies had been anxious about the potential appearance of these weapons for years, so their manifestation on the battlefield seemed like a nightmare come true. And it was unclear what else the Germans might have up their sleeve - an atomic bomb, perhaps? The desire of the Anglo-Americans to get the war over with as quickly as possible led to several weighty and consequential decisions, including the decision to launch a powerful air campaign against Germany in February 1945 - a campaign that included the air attack on the city of Dresden.
