INTERVIEW WITH SOMALI REFUGEE SAMMI MUYA

Wednesday, September 20 | 1:00 - 2:00 pm

Description: Donald Sensenig will interview Sammi Muya to elicit his gripping story. Muya grew up in rural southern Somalia as a tribal Bantu Christian minority. With the help of a Muslim friend, he escaped threats on his life as violence engulfed his country. Muya resettled in Lancaster as a refugee, with his wife and their five children. He now is a resource to the African refugee community, utilizing his fluency in Swahili and English.

Instructor: Mr. Donald Sensenig grew up in Akron, PA. After graduating from Eastern Mennonite University, he studied at New York University, while serving as Voluntary Service Unit leader in New York City. His family then spent 10 years in mission in Vietnam, from 1963-1973. Sensenig directed a refugee resettlement program with Mennonite Central Committee from 1975-1990 and interacted with refugees and resettlement agencies in Thailand from 1991-1993. He co-pastored Stumptown Mennonite Church 1994-2003, then semi-retired, but continues to interpret for Vietnamese people daily, in many settings.

MAY IT PLEASE THE COURT: UNDERSTANDING THE SUPREME COURT

Tuesday, October 10 | 10:00 - 11:30 am

Description: In the U.S., most policy questions turn into legal questions, and most of these can be resolved only by the Supreme Court. That Court is now the subject of numerous federal laws and customs. It is also under increasing scrutiny for lack of transparency and arguably unethical conduct by several members. The Court's most important role is to apply the Constitution, but it also deals with many technical matters of federal law. This course will focus on the nuts and bolts of the Court's actions, essentially a who, what, where, when, why, and how analysis.

Instructor: Professor Robert Power holds degrees from Brown University and Northwestern University School of Law. He taught Constitutional Law for 33 years and has written extensively about the Supreme Court. He retired from Widener Commonwealth Law School, where he served as a Distinguished Professor, the Young Professor of Constitutional Law, and as a dean. Before teaching, he was a trial attorney in government and private law practice.

He served two years as a NATO special weapons staff officer. Ricca currently serves as an on-call senior technical advisor to the federal government.

Description: From William Penn to Josh Shapiro, Pennsylvania's governors and their families have lived in a fascinating variety of domiciles, not only in Harrisburg, but throughout Pennsylvania and even in London, England! This illustrated lecture is an armchair tour of these historic landmarks, from Colonial-era Philadelphia to rental properties in the "new" Capital at Harrisburg on what came to be known as "Governors' Row," to the first stateowned executive mansion and "Keystone Hall," the Front Street abode so disliked it was replaced by a parking lot. Special attention is given to the decades-long effort to build the current Governor's Residence, completed in 1968.

Instructor: Mr. David Morrison is a published author and frequent lecturer on topics of local history, architecture, and urban affairs. He serves as Executive Director of the Historic Harrisburg Association, which has been promoting historic preservation, urban revitalization, and smart growth since 1973.


