INTRODUCTION TO PICKLEBALL

Course Topic: Wellness and Lifestyle

Description: This course will teach you the basics of the pickleball game. Explanations of the paddles and balls will be discussed. You will learn how the game is played and scored, and actual games using a doubles format will be played. You will be coached while playing on the court. A tennis-type shoe is required. Paddles and balls will be provided. This course is not suitable for those with balance issues. Pickleball requires less running mobility than tennis, however, please consult your physician before registering for the program.

Instructor: Larry Vittone is a pickleball instructor. Larry was the former administrator of the Capital Area Tennis League, a 75-member tennis league. In 2016, he became involved in teaching and playing pickleball. He founded and currently manages a 60-member group called MVP Pickleball. Course Topic: History

Description: Within the context of the roles First Ladies have played in U.S. history, in this course you will explore the special circumstances of the three women whose husbands parlayed military fame into successful runs for the White House. These women, unlike almost all of their counterparts, had no experience as the wife of a government official who served at the state and/or federal level. What difference did this make? Did these women bring special qualities to their role as First Lady after a lifetime as a military Wife?

Instructor: Dr. Carol Nechemias retired from Penn State Harrisburg, where she taught courses on women and politics for several decades. She also published research in this area, particularly on women's political participation.

Course Topic: Wellness and Lifestyle

Description: This short, educational workshop will address the following key points: Why is it important to know about Hospice and Palliative Care services now, before you need them? Who the services are for, and when they are appropriate? How are they paid for? Why not all service providers are equal, and how to choose a good provider? How to begin the conversation with doctors, family members and care partners? This educational workshop will also help you to become informed about hospice and palliative care options in a pressure-free environment.

Instructor: Glen Dunbar has graduate degrees from the Center for Aging Studies at the University of North Texas and the School of End-of-Life Studies at the University of Glasgow in Scotland. His primary career was as a policy specialist for State and Federal entities devoted to aging matters. After retiring, he began an encore career of teaching gerontology at a variety of colleges and universities. Glen is a dedicated hospice volunteer and continues his passion for promoting smart and purposeful aging because he has seen the benefit advance planning can make in the lives of older individuals and their loved ones.

SOLVING THE MEDICAL CRISIS ACROSS THE GLOBE

Friday, March 15 10:00 - 11:30 am

Course Topic: Contemporary Issues

Description: Since 1997, World Surgical Foundation (WSF) has been providing charitable surgical health care to the world's poor and underserved in developing nations in Asia, South America, and Africa. Volunteer surgeons and support staff provide life-changing surgeries and education to medical staff in local hospitals. Dr. Domingo Alvear will discuss what the surgical burden of disease is and how the WSF has been solving the medical crisis across the globe.

Instructor: With a medical career spanning more than 50 years, **Domingo Alvear, M.D.**, has operated on casualties of war, patients living in the poorest, most dangerous parts of the world, and generations of children. He helped establish neonatal intensive care units at Harrisburg Hospital and the former Polyclinic Hospital. With his wife, Dr. Veneranda B. Alvear, Domingo founded the World Surgical Foundation in 1997. Under his leadership, the foundation has performed more than 60 surgical missions, providing surgical care to more than 10,000 patients all over the globe.

ML107 A GRAND TOUR OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM

Course Topic: Nature, Science, and Technology

Description: Award-winning science journalist Robert Naeye will present a whirlwind tour of our solar system. He will explain how and when it formed, where it is located within the much larger Milky Way Galaxy, and which places offer the best prospects for finding extraterrestrial life. The presentation will be illustrated with beautiful images and artwork of the Sun, planets, moons, asteroids, comets, and rings.

Instructor: Robert Naeye has spent more than 30 years writing about space science for magazines such as Discover, Astronomy, and Sky and Telescope. He served as editor-in-chief of Sky & Telescope magazine from 2008 to 2014. He also worked as a senior science writer at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland. Robert is the author of two books about astronomy, and he contributed to three others.

Description: This course will give participants a lightly fragrant experience of vintage and modern perfumes. Using several references, Cheryl Harmon will share information about sources

for preparation of perfume (including a trip to Grasse, France)—use of flowers, etc. to create scents and how "notes" in a perfume are used. She will also share how she keeps a fragrance journal. A list of books that describe the world of perfumes will be distributed and participants will be offered a take-home vial or cotton ball sample of one of several fragrances. Participants are also welcome to bring a bottle/sample of their favorite perfume to discuss its notes and share what they love about the scent.

Instructor: Cheryl Harmon is a graduate of both Temple and Drexel Universities, with a B.S. in education and an M.S. in library science. Before retiring in 2015, Cheryl worked in the PA Department of Education on a team that reviewed school construction projects. As instructor for the Pathways Institute, Cheryl has presented several courses: "Laity Insights into the Bible," "An Invitation to Poetry," and, "Anthology of Women Poets and Housework." SURPRISED BY GOD IN MEDICAL MISSIONS AND MALARIA RESEARCH IN ZAMBIA

Wednesday, March 20 and 27 1:00 - 2:30 pm

Course Topic: Nature, Science, and Technology

Description: In the first session, John Spurrier will share the remarkable story of how God enabled the staff of Macha Mission Hospital in rural Zambia to improve the health of 165,000 people, including totally or nearly totally eliminating a large number of diseases including leprosy, measles, trachoma, schistosomiasis, malaria, and HIV/AIDS. In the second session, Phil Thuma will talk about the work in malaria research that led to a 98% reduction in that disease in the Macha area. This presentation will show how God is at work in the world—sometimes surprising those whom He uses for His purposes!

Instructors:

Dr. John Spurrier, M.D., attended Messiah University, Temple University Medical School, and did two years of surgical training in Springfield, Massachusetts. For 28 years, he and his wife worked at Macha Mission Hospital, operated by the Brethren in Christ Church in Zambia. During his time there, in addition to providing medical care in all departments of the hospital, he was the Medical Officer-in-Charge and oversaw the opening and operation of an HIV/AIDS clinic that eventually enrolled more than 11,000 patients.

After growing up in Zambia,

Dr. Phil Thuma, M.D., studied for his undergraduate degree in chemistry at Messiah University, and completed his medical degree at Temple University. He has spent most of his life and medical career working at Macha Mission Hospital as a medical doctor and researcher, concentrating initially on malaria and more recently overseeing projects on HIV/AIDS, child development, and Influenza/COVID-19.

Course Topic: History

Description: When people hear the name Milton Hershey, their thoughts usually go to Hershey's chocolate bar. But that candy bar, although important, was only one part of Milton's life and his incredible story. In this course, Craig Porterfefield will share with you the story of his hometown and the man behind it. You will see how Milton's childhood influenced him later in life, the setbacks he had to overcome in his early business endeavors, the story behind his decision to make the chocolate bar, the extraordinary story behind the town he created for his factory workers, as well as his enduring legacy, the Milton Hershey School.

Instructor: Craig Porterfield grew up in Hershey, and is a graduate of Messiah University. For a number of years, he was a Historical Conductor at Hershey Trolley Works where he combined his passions of history and storytelling to introduce people to his hometown and the inspiring account of the man who built it, Milton Hershey.
