She has published scholarly journal articles, book chapters, and co-edited two books in these fields. ## ENGAGING NEWS MEDIA: PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS FOR CONSUMING THE NEWS

**Course Topic:** Contemporary Issues

Wednesdays, March 20, 27 and April 3 | 10:00 am - 12:00 pm

**Description:** As a professional broadcast journalist, as well as a mass communications and journalism educator, Mark Kelley conceived the notion of writing a book that analyzed all news media, connecting it to the quest for truth. The book he wrote, *Engaging News Media* (Cowley Publications, Cambridge, MA, 2006), explores the state of the news media and their audiences today, attempting to examine whether truth can be found there, and if so, how people might be more successful in extracting it. This course follows his book.

Instructor: Mark Kelley, PhD, taught journalism and mass communications at Syracuse University and at the University of Maine. Prior to that, he was a broadcast news reporter, producer and TV anchor for 25 years. He is the author of *An Uncommon Woman: The Life of Lydia Hamilton Smith* (Penn State University Press, 2023) as well as a historical novel documenting his mother's experience working with the Manhattan Project. Kelley lives in Lancaster, PA, and is a contributor to the Thaddeus Stevens & Lydia Hamilton Smith Center for History and Democracy.

#### "DUEL:" THE #1 MADE-FOR-TV MOVIE OF ALL TIME THAT LAUNCHED THE CAREER OF STEVEN SPIELBERG

Course Topic: Culture, Arts and Music

**Description:** Steven Spielberg directed several episodes for television at age 21. Based on the quality of that work, Spielberg, at age 24, was offered the opportunity to direct a television film called "Duel" (1971) for the ABC Movie-of-the-Week series. This successful movie focused attention on Spielberg and resulted in the opportunities to direct his first feature film, "Sugarland Express" in 1974, and then the blockbuster "Jaws" in 1975, launching his incredible film career. In two class sessions we will watch the entire film, "Duel," while examining the advanced film techniques displayed by one of the greatest film directors of all time.

Instructor: Roger A. Godin, PhD, taught film and media studies at Franklin & Marshall College for over 10 years and has spent 50 years studying film history and analysis. Although his passion for film is widely inclusive, his first love remains the history of Hollywood, and the artistic and creative development of the American Film industry. He also loves all kinds of music, especially rock & roll and the amazing songs of the Great American Songbook.

**Description:** We are all familiar with Jesus' teaching to love our enemies, but how can we do that, and what role might art play? Presenter Mel Lehman directs a non-profit organization called Common Humanity (CommonHumanity.org) which uses art as a way of building bridges to the people of the Middle East and the Muslim world. Mel will use images of the art and the artists he has met on trips to these countries to help us see the humanity of people there who are often portrayed in our media as enemies.

Instructor: Mel Lehman, MA, grew up in Lancaster County. He has advanced degrees from Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University. He worked for 20 years at Church World Service and increasingly came to realize that the ordinary people he met in the Middle East were very unlike their images portrayed in the media. In 2009 he founded the peacemaking organization, Common Humanity, and has visited Dubai, Egypt, Lebanon, Iraq, Israel, Jordan, Oman, and Syria. He is married to Susan Miller, and they live in New York City where he is active with Manhattan Mennonite Fellowship.

## GETTING TO KNOW LANCASTER'S CENTRAL AND SOUTHERN MARKETS

#### Wednesday, May 8 | 9:00 am - 2:00 pm

**Description:** The oldest publicly owned and continuously running farmer's markets in America are located in downtown Lancaster city. Since 1730, Lancaster's Central Market has been the cornerstone of the community, visited by 3,000 people each week. Hundreds more visit Southern Market, now an international food court, built in 1888. Before boarding the bus to Lancaster, we will gather for a short overview in the High Foundation Auditorium about Lancaster's market history. On the excursion, the Central Market manager will give us an after-hours guided tour of the Central Market building, and speak to us about the market's current operations and significance. Afterward, we will walk one block to the iconic Southern Market for a short presentation on its history before lunch on our own in the food court.

**Instructor: Beth Graybill**, PhD, has taught college classes on food systems and farmers' markets. She lives in Lancaster, and regularly shops at Central Market and eats at Southern Market. She is the Pathways Institute Manager at Landis Homes.

# FOLLOWING IN NATIVE AMERICAN FOOTSTEPS: AMERICAN INDIAN SITES IN SOUTHERN LANCASTER COUNTY

Thursday, May 16 | 8:30 am - 3:30 pm

**Description:** For thousands of years, south-central Pennsylvania was home to Native American peoples. Experience local tribal history and cultural heritage on this one-of-a-kind trip. We will visit the Lancaster Longhouse, a replica indigenous communal dwelling. Next stop is the Indian Steps Museum to see their exhibit on John Smith's first contact with the Susquehannock peoples and eat our box lunch near a 350-year-old landmark tree. Later we will drive along the Old Minqua Path past Conestoga Indian landmarks, stopping at the Blue Rock Heritage Center to see artifacts and learn about Lancaster County's earliest inhabitants, the Shenk's Ferry native peoples. Our guides for the day will be MaryAnn Robins, president of Circle Legacy Center, and Judith Englert, Outreach Coordinator for Indian Steps Museum.

Instructors: Circle Legacy Center is a nonprofit organization based in Lancaster County and dedicated to supporting and empowering Native Americans through a variety of cultural events and community projects. Indian Steps Museum honors and celebrates local Native American cultures who lived along the Susquehanna River. Blue Rock Heritage Center aims to increase awareness about the archeological and historical significance of the Lower Susquehanna River Valley and its peoples. Through the Lancaster Longhouse, Mennonite Life works in collaboration to honor Pennsylvania's native communities and educate the public.

#### HISTORIC ROCK FORD
