

ML101 THE CONFEDERATE INVASION OF PENNSYLVANIA

Monday, March 10

1:00 - 2:15 pm

Course Topic: History

Description: In June 1863, more than 70,000 Confederate soldiers of Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia invaded Pennsylvania. They followed two main routes from Chambersburg, one heading east through Gettysburg and York and the other following Route 11 through Carlisle toward Harrisburg. Hastily organized and barely trained Pennsylvania militiamen tried to slow down the Confederates long enough for the Union Army of the Potomac to march to Pennsylvania from its camps in Virginia.

Instructor: Scott Mingus, multiple award-winning author, is a retired scientist and executive in the global specialty paper industry. He was part of the research team that developed the first commercially successful self-adhesive U.S. postage stamps, and he was a pioneer in the early development of bar code labels. He has written

more than 30 Civil War and Underground Railroad books and numerous articles for Gettysburg Magazine and other historical journals.

AN INFORMAL HISTORY OF ROCK & ROLL: 1950S-1970S

Tuesday, March 11, 18, 25, April 1, 8

1:00 - 3:00 pm

Course Topic: Culture, Arts, & Music

Description: This course begins with the emergence of the dominant Motown sound, the soulful artists of Stax Records in Memphis, Atlantic Records, the New York and Philly soul sound, and "white blue-eyed soul." We will hear and watch folk rock go electric, psychedelic rock emerge, and the explosion of singer-songwriters into a dominant genre. We'll conclude the course with the emergence of Bruce Springsteen and Michael Jackson. This is Part 2 of the "Informal History of Rock & Roll" from Fall 2024. It is worth taking this course, even if you did not enroll in Part 1.

Instructor: Dr. Roger Godin taught film and media studies at Franklin & Marshall College for more than 10 years, and has spent 50 years studying film history and analysis. Although Roger's passion for film is widely inclusive, his first love remains the history of Hollywood, and the artistic and creative development of the American film industry. He also loves all kinds of music, especially rock 'n' roll and the amazing songs of the Great American Songbook.




